HOW THINGS ARE GOING

Local Picture

- From excellent to poor
- Some Partnership Boards are ineffective
- Limited corporate authority engagement

National Picture

- Some impressive progress in some areas weak in others
- Not all Government Departments are fully engaged
- A renewed focus in the Department of Health



THE KEY CHALLENGES FOR LOCAL (and National) GOVERNMENT (1)

1. Demand and Resources.

- Significant growth in numbers of people
- Significant increase in levels of disability
- 2. Making a Reality of Citizenship
- Corporate Authority engagement
- Mainstreaming responses to what people say they want and need



THE KEY CHALLENGES FOR LOCAL (and National) GOVERNMENT (2)

- 3. Fall-out from Cornwall and Merton/Sutton
- Separate NHS/local government systems
- A lack of political priority
- Outdated services allowed to continue to exist
- A lack of a focus on advocacy and rights
- No independent inspection or overview
- POVA not working
- A lack of staff training



LOCAL AUTHORITY LEADERSHIP

Policy since 1991 that local authorities should be leading 'social care' commissioning

Policy since 2001 that local authorities could undertake 'lead commissioning'

Cornwall and Merton/Sutton were places where neither had happened

Minister has announced he will "strengthen the commissioning of learning disability services, (and) consider a stronger role for local authorities as part of this".
