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Appendix B – European and International Board Terms of Reference

The purpose of the European and International Board is to provide a strategic oversight of all the LGA's policy and improvement activity in relation to European and international work in line with the LGA priorities.

Boards should seek to involve councilors in supporting the delivery of these priorities (through task groups, rural and urban commissions, special interest groups (SIGs), regional networks and other means of wider engagement); essentially operating as the centre of a network connecting to all councils and drawing on the expertise of key advisors from the sector.

This board will be responsible for:

- 1. Developing a thorough understanding of council priorities and performance in the areas of responsibility, using strong networks and robust information.
- 2. Helping to shape the LGA Business plan by ensuring the priorities of the sector are fed into the process.
- 3. Overseeing a programme of work to deliver the strategic priorities set by the LGA Executive, covering lobbying and campaigns, research and or policy, good practice, improvement support and events as specified in the business plan, taking into account linkages with other policy boards where appropriate.
- 4. Representational and lobbying activities on behalf of the LGA and responsibility for the promulgation of activity through public statements in its areas of responsibility.
- 5. Building and maintaining effective relationships with key stakeholders.

An Overview of LGA European and International Work

In mid 2012, members reviewed the LGA's European and international service in light of a new LGA business plan which set out service priorities for the LGA.

This revised offer is set out in the attached report for members' information and Board members are asked to consider its relevance and any revisions that may be necessary in the short or medium term to address new opportunities and challenges, for example, from future EU proposals.

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- 1. The LGA has delivered a European and international service for its member councils over a long period. The service has covered four principle areas:
 - 1.1 Lobbying on EU legislative proposals that affect councils
 - 1.2 Bringing learning from international practice to support service delivery in councils
 - 1.3 Responding to demand from the developing world for support from English local government
 - 1.4 Supporting councillors who play a formal role on European consultative bodies (for example, Committee of the Regions and Congress)
- 2. The LGA now has a single business plan which sets out delivery priorities for the organisation in 2012-13. In July 2012, the European and international Board discussed how it would focus its work to support these priorities and develop a renewed offer to councils. From this discussion a renewed European and international offer to councils was developed which is detailed in **Appendix A**.
- 3. This offer sets out the priorities of the Board and the issues that will be brought to the Board for discussion. Given the new membership of the Board, Members are asked to consider this offer again and new Board members may wish to comment on the offer and its relevance to their councils. The LGA will start to develop its business plan for 2013-14 over the autumn. Members may wish to consider any new work areas on the horizon and consider how this offer is developed for the next business plan. Appendix B sets out the 2012 EU work programme in full.
- 4. Appendix C lists the LGA officers that form the European and International team.

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APPENDIX A

The renewed LGA's European and international offer to councils (May 2012)

The service priorities set out in the LGA business plan in 2012-13 were as follows:

- Public Service Reform
- Growth and Prosperity
- Funding and local government
- Efficiency and productivity
- Sector-led improvement

Each LGA Board was asked to develop a programme of work which addressed these priorities. The European and International Board considered its response earlier in the year and set out its work priorities as an offer to member councils, i.e. a description of the European and International service upon which members could call.

This is set out below against LGA priority work themes:

PUBLIC SERVICE REFORM

A major priority of the LGA in 2012-13 will be to pursue a programme of public service reform. As over 50 per cent of all regulation affecting councils originates from EU proposals, we will focus on those EU proposals which provide the greatest opportunities or threats to councils' ability to delivery quality public services.

Our offer to councils:

LGA annual EU lobbying programme

In November, the Board will consider the European Commission's 2013 work programme which contains policy and legislative proposals for the year ahead; it is the EU equivalent of the Queen's speech. From this, the LGA will develop a focused lobbying programme on those proposals which will have an administrative, financial or regulatory impact on our member authorities, or the services that they provide or procure. This will be combined with other EU lobbying priorities from previous years which are still going through the EU decision-making process. This exercise is coordinated by LGA staff responsible for EU work with detailed support from specialists across the organisation.

2012 lobbying priorities

The 2012 EU work programme was published in October 2011. It is an extensive programme with 28 EU proposals that could affect the work of local government; the full list is attached at **Appendix B**. Board Members endorsed the long list of issues in January and recommended a set of six lobbying priorities for the LGA to work on during 2012. These are:

- Reform of EU public procurement rules.
- Directive on energy efficiency.



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- Campaign to localise future EU funding 2014-2020 including structural funds.
- Review of the Working Time Directive.
- Review of the Air Quality Directive.
- EU fines (part of the Localism Act) see below.

In lobbying, the LGA works in partnership with leading Members, technical experts from councils, other national associations, Council of European Municipalities and Regions (CEMR - the European LGA), Committee of the Regions (CoR), UK Parliament, and networks of council experts to influence decisions in Whitehall, Westminster and Brussels.

Lobbying and relationship management in Brussels and the UK

In order to lobby effectively, the LGA will maintain a close relationship with a range of decision-makers and opinion-formers to maximise the impact of our lobbying in Brussels and the UK. Specifically this includes:

Brussels: Commission officials, CEMR, CoR, MEPs (including LGA Vice-Presidents), UKRep, UK regional offices, other national LGAs, business and trade union representatives in Brussels.

UK: EU leads in Whitehall departments, UK Parliament, European Commission and European Parliament UK representations, and relevant stakeholders.

The political relationship with MEPs and MPs on key parliamentary committees is an area where LGA members make a significant contribution to lobbying strategies. This is especially the case in our relationship with LGA Vice-Presidents on the European Parliament.

Supplementing the relationship management highlighted, the LGA will continue to develop an annual theme-based UK local government summits in Brussels. The intention this year is to organise a summit in Brussels to focus on our EU funding campaign. *This work is detailed in a later report.*

Policy briefings and intelligence

The LGA will deliver a national policy information service through a monthly bulletin, funding tracker and other media. This will provide information on policy proposals/changes, key LGA lobbying events so councils can influence them, early-warning so that councils can support lobbying locally with MPs, MEPs and Ministers, and progress on key lobbying objectives. Watching briefs will be maintained on other EU proposals outside our core lobbying priorities, to ensure other risks/opportunities are monitored, and escalated if necessary.

Working with Whitehall on the delivery of EU law and regulation

The devolution of EU fines under the Localism Act demonstrates the continued impact of EU regulation on councils, and more importantly, and the Government's responsibility to turn EU regulations into effective UK law. Poor communication of EU responsibilities or badly



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enacted UK responses may have a financial impact on councils. Thus LGA's EU work needs a greater Whitehall focus in future.

In 2012/13, the focused offer for councils will be:

- Ensure that any attempt to devolve EU fines to local authorities is fair and evidence-based.
- A clear process for parliamentary and independent scrutiny is in place should a local authority wish to challenge an attempt to pass down a fine. Local government expertise is adequately represented on the independent advisory panel.
- A programme of support for our member authorities to help avoid any imposition of EU fines.

The LGA will also work across Government to ensure that the implementation of EU law is effective and appropriate. The LGA will:

- Lead a Whitehall Summit to ensure that all Government departments are meeting their responsibilities in the implementation of EU law under the Localism Act.
- On our EU priority issues, identify lead EU Whitehall specialists and ensure they are supported and challenged by LGA leads on the same issue.
- Develop a link with Whitehall departments to identify areas where there is a risk of an EU fine and seek to address these issues within Whitehall and our sector.

The development of this work in 2012/13 is detailed in later report.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT FINANCE

EU structural funds provide an £8 billion investment into the UK over seven years. These funds are some of the few remaining public resources to support local regeneration. These funds are being reformed in 2012-13 and we will prioritise our lobbying in both Brussels and Whitehall on this issue.

OUR OFFER TO COUNCILS:

Securing future investment from the EU

As identified above, this forms one of our major EU lobbying priorities. There is a huge demand from the sector for a concerted national LGA effort to represent their interests both in Whitehall and Brussels. The LGA's campaign aims to ensure that councils continue to have the opportunity to receive investment from EU regeneration funds, and that it is far more flexible locally than is currently the case. We will lead the debate to ensure local authority ideas are considered, and that we work with other stakeholders to ensure that our ideas are shared.

The strategy includes working with all five Government departments, including a Chatham House arrangement to support new ideas for local delivery, securing local government secondments into Department of Business, Innovation and Skills (BIS) to help develop the



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UK position, engagement with MEPs and the lead European Commissioner, and feeding into UK parliamentary debates.

Early warning on funding opportunities

The LGA will provide a monthly bulletin and alerts on funding opportunities for councils to provide intelligence on funding calls: service area, amount, partners needed, deadline, etc. The LGA will work with regional associations to ensure that councils have access to any EU (technical assistance) resources to support funding applications.

SECTOR SELF-IMPROVEMENT

Managing the demand upon LGA member authorities from the developing world

The LGA will provide a gateway to manage the growing demand for UK local government practitioners to support developing local government abroad. There is a formal relationship with the Commonwealth LGA (CLGF), EU, Foreign and Commonwealth Office (FCO) and Department for International Development (DFID). The LGA promotes the use of practitioners to deliver aid programmes, rather than expensive consultants to ensure greater value-for money from international, EU and UK aid budgets as well as ensuring on the ground expertise. We will continue to work with aid organisations and the private sector to secure extra funding for this work to ensure that councils have additional resources to undertake this work.

In 2012/13, this work will be focused on two programmes. Firstly, a programme with the pan African LGA to pilot peer review as the basis for local government improvement across the continent (funded by Luxembourg) and secondly, the LGA's new approved supplier status with the Department of International Development which ensures that UK practitioners will form part of bids to deliver UK aid in future.

Supporting service improvement from international practice

The LGA will continue to disseminate knowledge through the web and seminars about innovative and basic good practice from abroad. More importantly, we will use international practice in our lobbying work to test the boundaries of the UK local/central settlement. In 2012, there will be a focus two LGA campaigns: local growth and local government finance.

UNDERPINNING OUR WORK FOR COUNCILS

Providing a national secretariat for councillors on formal European bodies

The LGA will provide a single, national secretariat to support UK members on statutory European bodies, for example, on the EU CoR and the Council of Europe. To ensure effective and responsive support to all UK members, LGA officers work closely with officers from across the UK to ensure they feed into our policy support to members. In summary, there will be a policy briefing on issues at each plenary and committee meeting, support for



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lobbying and governance issues, support to "rapporteurs" on key issues and on-the-spot advice at committees and plenary sessions.

A national resource in Brussels

The LGA Brussels Office is based in the EU Quarter and is co-located with CEMR, Eurocities, over 20 other LGAs and individual regions and cities. The LGA offers one hot-desk in our office (including internet and meeting facilities) for occasional use by member councils if there are meetings to be attended in Brussels. This is available to LGA member councils as a temporary Brussels base. The shared building also has larger meeting spaces for short-term rent, which we would be happy to make available for councils (fee charged by our landlord).

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Item 4

EU Funds update and Brussels lobby, September 2012

Context

- 1. The EU structural funds typically support economic and skills development activity, and are regularly accessed by local authorities to help realise local ambitions.
- 2. The funds are worth over £8 billion to the UK over the 2007-2013 period. Once match-funded the funds represent a total potential investment of over £16 billion. They include the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) and the European Social Fund (ESF). Further investment opportunities are available to councils through the EU-supported Rural Development Programme for England. Certain specialist EU funds dealing with research, the environment, and businesses competitiveness are also available. Increasingly the EU is offering loans as well as grants to support regeneration and SMEs.

Background

- 3. The LGA is leading a major campaign in the UK and Brussels to ensure a more 'local' approach to the funds in the future. The objective is to ensure that councils are able to lead, shape and use these funds in whatever way is most appropriate for their area. This work is led by this Board and lobbying is focused on the 2013-2020 funding package.
- 4. Whilst local government values the funds, Government is pushing for a reduction in the EU's overall budget meaning there is no certainty about the value of EU funds for regeneration from 2013.
- 5. In Whitehall, Government has recently concluded its 'informal consultation' on the future of the programmes. There was a strong response from local authorities. Many set out ambitious plans for shaping EU spending around their local economic priorities.
- 6. The LGA has secured two local authority secondments into BIS, the responsible Government department, to help ensure local perspectives are built into the future delivery arrangements in England. The secondments are a first and are to ensure a strong local-central approach as the future programmes are being developed. The secondees have met with many local authorities across England, including the Board in July. Members may wish to invite the secondees for discussions on the future of EU Funds in their own localities.
- 7. In Brussels and across Europe the approach on behalf of local authorities is more coordinated than in the past and is showing results. In particular the LGA's alliance with other EU LGA's has secured significant changes to EU rules including:
 - 7.1 new possibilities for local authorities to be closely involved in the design and delivery of the funds:
 - 7.2 stronger rules on governments working in partnership with local authorities;
 - 7.3 greater opportunity for local strategies to help steer delivery; and

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- 7.4 new opportunities for the involvement of local community groups.
- 8. The LGA has worked with associations from across Europe to develop a common position and a common set of legislative amendments in the European Parliament to ensure these and other gains for local government feature strongly in the final version of the rules.
- 9. A range of publications have also been produced to ensure a strong case for a 'local' approach to the funds. The most recent one will be available at the Board meeting.

Upcoming issues

- 10. Autumn 2012 is a crucial period in determining what the funds will look like from 2014-2020, and what role councils can play in delivering them. LGA will focus on influencing Government's thinking and on influencing the votes due to take place in the European Parliament.
- 11. Work being planned includes a delegation to Brussels to secure support from MEPs; work to identify and promote future sources of match-funding and a publication with case studies evidencing the benefits of a local approach to delivery.
- 12. The evidence for the latter piece of work is based on local authorities' own plans for the delivery of EU funds locally after 2013. The stage and detail of thinking varies between places. For instance several same groups of councils have ambitious plans and are looking to manage entire programmes rather than simply apply for funding for individual projects. The EU is promoting this and has created a tool, the 'Integrated Territorial Investment', to make delivery at local rather than regional level more easily achieved.

Delegation to Brussels

- 13. The LGA delegation to Brussels on the 17-18 September 2012 aims to influence MEPs ahead of key votes in the Autumn in the European Parliament.
- 14. The delegation is cross party and comprises of councillors from the E&I Board. They are: Cllrs Barnes, Bore, Kemp, Keymer, Flint, Nicholson, Sparks, Wilcox. Carolyn Downs the LGA's Chief Executive will also participate, as will LGA officers.
- 15. Delegation members have a series of one-to-one meetings with MEPs on the morning of the 18 September, followed by a roundtable discussion with stakeholders and EU institutions in the afternoon. English local and regional Brussels offices, as well as stakeholders from other interest groups, have been invited to participate in the discussion session.
- 16. The following issues are some which could be raised with MEPs:
 - 16.1 How best to protected investment for regional development in the EU's budget negotiations?
 - 16.2 How best to maximise the take from these funds for local areas?
 - 16.3 How best to embed localism principles into the design, management and delivery of EU funds in England?

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- 16.4 How best to promote the message that councils should play a leading role in the negotiation and establishment of the new programmes and are well placed to do so?
- 16.5 How to ensure councils, including Local Enterprise Partnerships (LEPs) and core cities, realise their place-shaping role by managing the dispersal of EU funds themselves in their own areas?
- 16.6 How to ensure more simplification in the funds and that EU rules enable local partners to better join-up EU funds with other investments in their areas such as the Regional Growth Fund?
- 16.7 What more can be done in the European Parliament to address the issue of a lack of match-funding?
- 17. Board members are asked to provide views on any other EU funding issues to be raised by the delegation.
- 18. The delegation will ask MEPs to use their influence in Brussels by supporting LGA amendments in the upcoming votes in the European Parliament. Also MEPs will be asked to promote LGA messages to the UK Government's representation in Brussels (UKRep).
- 19. MEPs' influence can also be exercised in Westminster during party conferences by committing to meet with MPs and government departments. Finally MEPs will be asked to publicise LGA messages on their websites and use local case studies in the regional media.
- 20. Key English and Welsh MEPs have been kept up to date throughout 2012 with LGA key messages and voting recommendations on EU funds. Several of the LGA MEP Vice Presidents have been particularly helpful in tabling amendments, or securing local government events in the European Parliament.
- 21. 'Local Link', the LGA's e-bulletin specifically for English MEPs, has also been launched ahead of the visit to ensure they are informed of the LGA's EU work across all policy areas.
- 22. A report on the outcome of the delegation to Brussels will be circulated to E&I Board members.

Next Steps

- 23. Agreement is needed on the legislative package governing the funds at EU level by mid 2013 at the latest if new the programming period is to start on time in January 2014. In previous programming rounds discussions on the EU's budget have overrun and programmes have started with a delay of six months or more. The LGA is pushing for a timely agreement between the Council of Ministers and the European Parliament to ensure local authorities can benefit from the new funding round as soon as possible.
- 24. Members are asked to consider and comment on any other EU funding issues which should form part of the LGA's ongoing work programme on EU funds in 2013.

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Item 5

EU Financial Sanctions

Summary

1. This paper provides an overview of the LGA's work to influence the EU financial sanctions policy in the Localism Act, and seeks Members views on delivering a new central-local relationship on EU proposed laws.

The issue

- Central government negotiates, signs, and transposes EU laws. Once transposed into UK statutory instruments, EU Directives have a significant, administrative, financial and regulatory impact on the way local authorities are run, and the services they provide or procure, costing time and money to implement.
- 3. Examples of the how EU Directives affect councils include:
 - 3.1 energy efficiency targets for municipal buildings and housing stock;
 - 3.2 Recycling/waste laws framing local environmental and waste services;
 - 3.3 Procurement rules guiding the way councils buy goods, works and services;
 - 3.4 Working Time rules which regulate shift patterns in Fire and Rescue Authorities and residential care homes; and
 - 3.5 consumer policy establishing principles for trading standards.
- 4. However, while local authorities (e.g. through Committee of the Regions) seek to influence the drafting of EU laws, they have no direct decision making power. The LGA is on the record in criticising past and present Governments for ineffective consultation when it negotiates, agrees and implements EU laws affecting them.
- 5. In terms of local/central relations on EU issues, the Localism Act 2011 was a "game changer". As a result of the Act, any fines imposed on the Government by the EU (for failure to implement EU law properly) could be devolved to local government, if a council has contributed to the national failure to deliver.
- 6. The LGA had significant concerns about Bill's original proposals, which would have given Ministers powers to arbitrarily pass on a fine to a local authority. The LGA called for the proposals to be scrapped on the grounds they were unfair, unworkable, dangerous to their budgets, and unconstitutional. The LGA identified that no other country had legislated for a law of this kind without devolving the requisite financial autonomy or ability to influence EU laws to local (or regional) government. The 'unconstitutional' issue most exercised councils and legal commentators as it offered no independent appeal process in case of dispute between the authority and the Minister, who would in effect be judge and jury even though Government was likely to be partly to blame for incurring the fine.



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LGA campaign to influence

- 7. LGA elected members and officers took every opportunity to discuss this with Ministers from the Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG), DEFRA, and the Cabinet Office. In the Commons, the LGA briefed MPs and there were calls for the policy to be scrapped.
- 8. When the Bill reached the Lords, it was clear Government would not delete the clauses. Sustained lobbying by the LGA, on behalf of our member authorities, and the Greater London Authority, resulted in a major rethink of Government policy to ensure sufficient safeguards were in place should the policy ever be used. A compromise was presented at Lords report stage. LGA lead members and peers secured key concessions, which are detailed below.
- 9. The final Act requires Ministers to lay before both Houses of Parliament, on a case-by-case basis, details of every council they intend to pass on a fine to, including the EU infraction they are alleged to have breached and the UK obligation. This will be subject to a vote in both Houses. An independent advisory panel, which will include representatives from local government, will advise and recommend, on the authority's culpability.
- 10. Ministers using the legislation must have regard to a statutory statement of government policy. The LGA drafted its own version with the aim of building in protections for councils. Our draft sought to commit government to a new way of working with local government around the principles of working in partnership when EU laws are being drafted; developing a fair, reasonable and proportionate process to apportion fines and a clear consideration of the ability to pay. The Government converted our proposal into a Whitehall version and consulted key stakeholders. The LGA also responded to the consultation, and was satisfied with the final statement published by Government in June 2012 which provides for a fairer and more transparent system.

New central-local relationship on EU proposed laws

- 11. Devolution of fines under the Localism Act demonstrates the continued impact of EU regulation on local authorities, and the Government's responsibility to turn EU regulations into effective UK law. Through the work on EU fines, local government has the opportunity to renew its partnership with Government in Parliament and Whitehall and to play a greater role when UK positions on new EU laws are being formulated.
- 12. Now that the work on the policy framework has been finalised, the Board needs to consider some formal mechanism to ensure that the spirit of partnership which was formulated during these negotiation becomes a working practice. Board members are asked to consider the options below. From members' discussion, the following work is suggested. The Board may want to consider what support we can give to councils to avoid the devolution of any EU fines. Board support could include:



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- 12.1 Ensuring that any attempt to devolve EU fines to local authorities is fair and evidence-based. The LGA will ensure local government expertise is adequately represented on the **independent advisory panel** from within the sector (see paragraph 9). This will be progressed during the autumn.
- 12.2 Supporting councils to mitigate the imposition of EU fines. for instance since the Act introduces new liability issues into **public contracts**, the LGA will work with our member authorities to ensure they consider EU fines issues, and that respective liabilities are appropriately highlighted to contractors, and/or reflected in current (where appropriate) and future contracts.
- 12.3 Inputting council views into Whitehall's draft explanatory memoranda which indicate the initial UK Government stance to proposed EU laws. This work started in September 2012.
- 13.LGA will work across Government to ensure implementation of EU law is effective and appropriate. It is suggested that the Board could consider:
 - 13.1 Leading a local/central **EU summit with key Government departments** focusing discussions on 2013 EU work programme proposals which most affect council services, to ensure Government is committed to involve us in developing UK positions on EU law and in the way it is transposed.
 - 13.2 Building a **relationship with parliamentarians** in relevant scrutiny committees in the Commons and Lords, and with key Whitehall department with an interest in EU developments to ensure that the impact of future EU law on Councils is considered by Parliamentarians.

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Item 6

European Bodies Update

Congress of local and regional authorities

- 1. Congress is the local government arm of the Council of Europe, based in Strasbourg. It acts as the guardian of local democracy and good governance, which it achieves by scrutinising how each country implements the provisions of the European Charter of Local Self-Government and it organises election observation missions to ensure fair and transparent electoral processes. It also promotes exchange of experience and good practice in key policy areas for local councils. The current Congress President is Keith Whitmore (Manchester). The LGA provides the secretariat for the full UK Delegation.
- 2. Members of Congress are local councillors nominated by each member nation. The current Congress mandate expires on 15 October and a new delegation for 2012-16 needs to be in place by October 2012. The LGA is responsible for nominating 13 English full members and 13 alternates, out of a total of 18.
- 3. The nomination process has been organised by LGA political groups and they submitted final lists in August. The resulting UK Delegation meets targets for both gender and ethnicity and is politically balanced (based on current LGA proportions). The delegation covers and has representation from each English region, covers all type and size of authority and has a mix of urban and rural. The full list is attached at **Appendix A**.
- 4. The UK Delegation will meet for the first time on 15 October when it will elect its political office-holders and agree allocations to committees.
- 5. One of the first high-profile tasks of the new delegation will be to consider the report of a peer review of UK local/central relations. The Congress visit to scrutinise local democracy in the UK will now take place in February 2013 and will include a visit to the LGA.

CEMR (Council of European Municipalities and Regions)

- 6. The CEMR is the European association of LGAs from across Europe, and can be described as the "European LGA". It's main role is to lobby on new EU legislation on issue that concern local councils; it is increasingly successful in this, due in large part by being able to speak on behalf of over 100,000 local councils.
- 7. The CEMR was first established in Paris over 60 years ago, although in recent decades the weight of the organisation has shifted more towards Brussels, where it is co-located with the LGA and associations from nearly 20 other countries.
- 8. The LGA has campaigned for many years to locate the CEMR exclusively in Brussels in order to be more efficient, more visible, and to save money. The French LGA has consistently blocked such a move, but the recent decision of the City of Paris to give notice to CEMR from its subsidised premises has created the catalyst for change. The French LGA has therefore lifted its objection to relocation from Paris and this was confirmed at a meeting of the Executive Bureau on 4 September, in which Cllr Keymer



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played an active role as UK representative and Vice-Chair of the CEMR Finance Committee. Although the move will need to be staged over a few years to minimise costs of redundancies, we expect this to be completed within 3-5 years.

Committee of the Regions (CoR)

- 9. The CoR is a formal consultative body of the European Union. Its remit is to comment on forthcoming EU laws from a local and regional perspective. The LGA provides the secretariat for the full UK Delegation, which comprises 24 full and 24 alternate members.
- 10. In the May 2012 local elections three members of the LGA-nominated UK Delegation chose not to stand. These members were Amanda Byrne (Conservative, Yorkshire), Flo Clucas (Liberal Democrat, North-West), Peter Moore (Liberal Democrat, Yorkshire). The relevant LGA political groups have nominated to these vacancies and the following nominations will be put forward to the various Government Departments for approval: Paula Baker (Liberal Democrat, South East) from an alternate member to a full member; Dee Sharpe (Conservative, Yorkshire) as a full member; and Stewart Golton (Liberal Democrat, Yorkshire) and Margaret Lishman (Liberal Democrat, North West) as alternate members.
- 11. Still going through the Whitehall machinery are nominations to replace three Scottish MSPs from the Scottish Parliamentary elections in May 2011. Even more outstanding is the LGA nomination made in November 2010 of a replacement of a Labour member, despite repeated pressure on civil servants.
- 12. In its political work, the CoR has now adopted a report by LGA member Cllr Kay Twitchen on funding for environmental projects, and a report by former Board member Cllr Nilgun Canver on environmental law has now reached the committee stage; both reports were drafted by an LGA staff member.

Welcome and Introductions

The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting and noted all those apologies received.

1 Update on International work

Ivor Wells and Drago Djekovic (Advisors) provided a presentation on the current international work being undertaken by the LGA, the principles underpinning this work, and potential future opportunities based on demand and external funding.

Ivor provided a detailed overview of the delivery phase of the African Peer Review Project and lessons learned so far. Feedback from the first Peer Review had been very positive and provided a solid foundation for the continued delivery of the next stages of the programme.

With reference to a number of approaches from private sector companies expressing an interest in collaborating with the LGA on international projects, Drago outlined some of the potential collaborative opportunities open to the LGA, through public and private sector financing. The Chairman drew attention to the potential availability of funding for a project around conflict resolution in Sri Lanka as well as current work ongoing between the LGA, the Foreign Office and British Embassy in Mexico to explore the role that councils can play in opening up new markets for UK firms in Mexico. Members were asked to provide a steer on the appropriate level of LGA involvement in externally funded international projects.

A detailed discussion followed, in which Members made a number of comments, which were responded to by officers, relating to issues including:

African Peer Review

- With reference to the successes of the first African Peer Review, Members thanked officers for their hard work.
- In terms of maximising the learning gained from the programme, it was suggested that any project evaluation include an external element.



Future International Opportunities

- With reference to the lengthy process, and uncertainty
 of success in securing external contracts, it was
 suggested that subject to appropriate due diligence
 measures, any appropriate opportunities for further
 international work should be pursued.
- Members also advised that in forming future partnerships, reputational issues need to be considered.

2 EU Funds Post 2013 - Update and Lobby Strategy

Sue Baxter, the senior civic servant leading the UK negotiations on structural fund reform from the Department for Business, Innovation and Skills (BIS), provided a detailed overview of the latest position in the EU-wide negotiations and legislative timescale. In doing so she highlighted a policy shift, with a greater focus on structural funds as a driver of EU growth in the global market. Sue outlined the 11 themes within the Common Strategic Framework for 2014-2020, noting, however, that the final list of priorities for the UK had not yet been confirmed. In outlining the Commission's proposed changes to the funds and tools for implementation, she highlighted potential challenges and opportunities for local councils as a result of these changes.

Kevin Richardson, a local government employee seconded to BIS as part of the UK negotiating team on EU structural funds reform updated Members on how local authorities could engage in the negotiations and highlighted a number of common themes from the sector's contribution to BIS's



informal consultation in April. He expressed cautious optimism regarding levels of engagement and understanding across the sector, however highlighted the need to connect with councils currently not engaged in the debate.

A detailed discussion arose in which Members made a number of comments, which were responded to by officers, relating to the following issues:

- A discussion arose regarding the EU legislative timescale and Whitehall processes and timescales for UK Ministerial approval. It was noted that at present, there were different lines of thought in the key Government Departments.
- With reference to the Commission's proposed changes, Members emphasised the importance of developing mechanisms for more integrated programmes.
- In discussing how to connect with councils not currently engaged in the negotiations, Jasbir Jhas (Senior Advisor) outlined a number of LGA activities to engage councils as well as develop a strong evidence case to demonstrate how local approaches can deliver better outcomes and efficiencies to help make this case in Brussels and Whitehall.

Adrian Cannard, from the East of England LGA (EELGA) updated Members on the support the EELGA provides to councils in making EU funding applications. He explained that the support offered to councils, (including training, workshops, bid writing and external expertise), was designed to help councils build up their own capacity to equip them with the expertise to secure EU funding without additional support in future. He outlined a number of successes as well as challenges the programme has faced and suggested how such a programme could be rolled out to other areas post-2013.

In the discussion that followed Members made a number of comments, which were responded to by officers, relating to the following issues:

 With reference to the level of demand on specific funding streams, Members expressed concerns about the sector's overall uptake of EU funding opportunities.



 The Chair noted that as part of the LGA's programme of lobbying activities, lead members were to agree a delegation of members from the Board to lobby key MEPs and European Commission officials in Brussels in September.


