Emerging Propositions

- 1. Sustaining an assertive and selfconfident approach to government
 - Effective lobbying: not in supplicant mode
 - Members of Parliament too



2. Supporting and Challenging Councils' relationship with the public

- continuing the Reputation Campaign
- sustaining communication to influence public understanding
- influencing government through the wider public



3. More use of the expertise and practice of the sector

- contributions from individual Councils
- national Ambassadors and Advisers



4. Leading the debate on the most important issues

- developing public debate on climate change / the ageing population / antisocial behaviour / inward migration / community cohesion
- developing an "LGA Futures" capacity



5. Leading and joining more national coalitions of partners

- strategic alliances to shape policy
- a national Public Service Partnership board



6. Leadership on poor performance in the sector

- upholding the reputation of local government
- but not becoming a regulator
- support through peers



7. Leadership on the recruitment of future Councillors

- the visible representatives of local government
- talent and diversity
- working with the political parties



8. The importance of the LGA Chairman and Group Leaders

- proper support and compensation
- framework for profile, remuneration, renewal, back-up



9. Diversity and flexibility in representation for local government

- well served since 1997
- engaging active leaders
- use of senior officials too



10. Greater focus for support bodies

- central bodies to focus on benchmarking and facilitating to assist improvement
- and identifying overarching needs and commissioning support
- greater clarity in roles



11. Clarity on relationships with groups of member authorities

- value of Commissions, Special Interest Groups, Regional LGAs
- regional-central links
- but not new federal constitution
