LGA Improvement Board spearheaded:

- Total Place pilots and parallel working
 - *Freedom to Lead* campaign to reduce the burden of inspection on councils
 - Local government has a good track record of making efficiency savings
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2. The Context for the new government

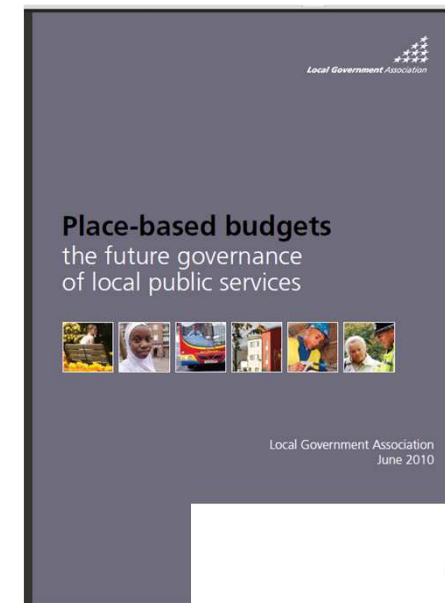
The Government has identified three significant and interlocking challenges:

- How to restore confidence in public finances
- How to rebuild trust in politics; and
- How to tackle entrenched economic, social and environmental problems.

“Localism” and “Big Society” are seen as important levers to address the challenges

Our response

- giving elected councils control over local spending through local place-based budgets and new models of governance
- proposed cuts to central bureaucracy worth £4.5bn a year
- a robust new system of self-regulation for councils building on proposals in *Freedom to Lead*



What the new government has done

- Coalition Agreement commitment to promote decentralisation and democratic engagement, giving new powers to councils
 - A Decentralisation and Localism Bill will be introduced after the summer recess
 - But for the government, decentralisation also means citizen choice and the Big Society, not simply handing power to councils.
 - Greg Clark MP, Decentralisation Minister, to lead proposals to further reduce inspection of LAs
 - CAA brought to an immediate end - this includes area assessment and organisational assessment
 - OFSTED's annual assessment of children's services under review and Michael Gove promoted self improvement in his LGA Conference speech
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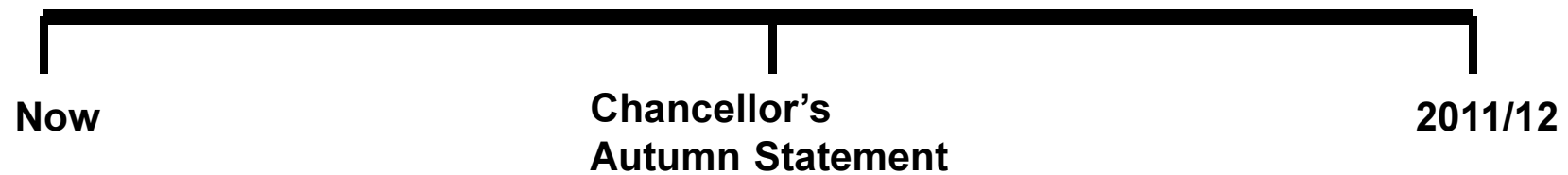
3. Place-based budgets

- LGA has put place-based budgets firmly at the centre of the spending review for local government;
 - Chief Secretary and Secretary of State for CLG have asked for a place-based budgeting submission alongside departmental submissions to the SR
 - Over 40 Total Place and parallel working propositions submitted to HMT on budgets areas would like devolved
 - Cross-government senior official-level work is in hand and will report by the end of July: LGA Group and council chief executives are involved in the process
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Place-based budgets: our ask

- We want to see place-based budgets for a comprehensive set of public services – the list includes public health, crime and disorder, offender management, unemployment and others; this should amount to a significant amount of money;
 - This goes with a market-making and facilitating role in local services funded in choice-based ways (GP commissioning or free schools, for example);
 - LGA policy is the principle that this is available for all areas – although a uniform “big bang” may not be an achievable ask;
 - It should be a matter for areas to decide what their geography is and what their local governance model is.

Propositions by councils “ready to go”



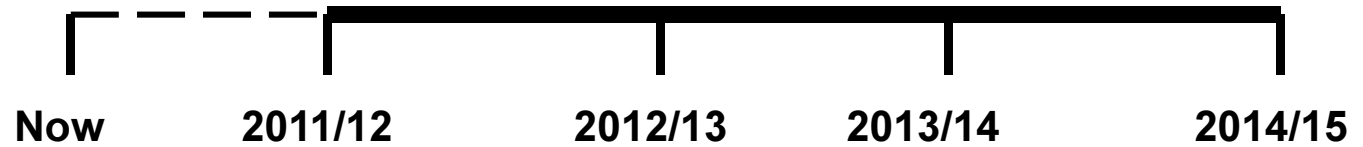
Agreement to 1st Phase prototypes



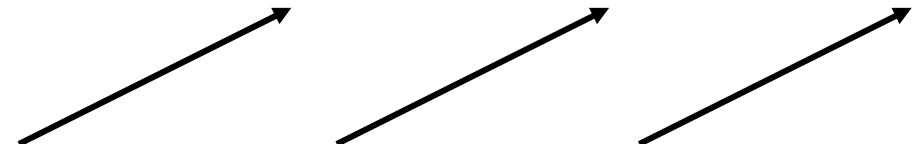
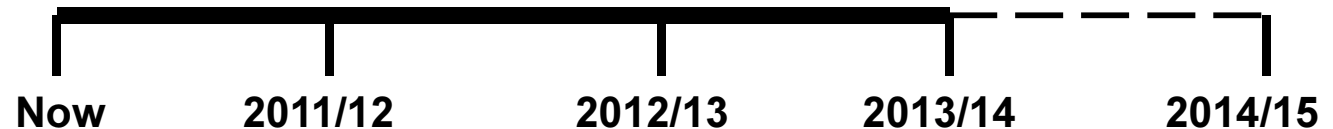
First phase of roll out begins

Productive Councils, Productive Places

The Place Based Productivity workstreams will:

- support councils to give an assurance to government that they are able to manage larger budgets for their area,
 - use the best talents of the sector on specific areas that councils and partners have identified need addressing
 - ensure skills transfer within the sector from prototypes/early phases to councils receiving placed-based budgets in later phases,
 - build on other sectors' good practice to create new skills and tools,
 - work with partners to create capacity to improve productivity across all public spending in local areas,
 - spread existing good practice to deliver productivity gains from existing efficiency techniques,
 - develop tools to deliver transformational change by configuring outcomes in different ways and ensuring optimal allocation of funding
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9 proposed work streams being set up



- 1 Procurement, capital and shared assets**
- 2 Workforce and skills**
- 3 Adult social care**
- 4 Children's services**
- 5 Shared services across areas, tiers and partnerships**

- 6 Democratic leadership**
- 7 Tackling central government barriers and burdens**
- 8 Big Society and shaping markets**
- 9 Data and transparency**

Work streams are being established with leading experts including from local government, partner organisations, the private sector and government departments. The work will support the roll out of place-based budgets and provide tools to save money and maintain quality as revenue support grant is reduced.

4. A new model of self-regulation

In line with the LG Group's offer to Government, we are developing radical proposals to:

- design a new Central and Local Government agreement, using transparency to support local accountability and reduce costs
 - support local government self improvement
 - reduce the burden of inspection on councils and provide early warning of risk of failure
 - lead the debate to shape what will develop to replace CAA and other inspections
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A sector owned approach to self regulation and improvement (1)

1. Using transparency to support local accountability

- local performance information publicly available
 - cut back on central reporting
 - sector owned benchmarking tool to provide comparability on unit costs, productivity and outcomes
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A sector owned approach to self regulation and improvement (2)

2. Local government self improvement

- self assessment and peer challenge
- place based budgets and supporting efficiency/productivity work streams
- Review 11 leadership /improvement bodies

3. Early warning of the risk of failure

- early warning signals
 - sharing intelligence about place
 - providing support to prevent risk of failure
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A sector owned approach to self regulation and improvement (3)

4. Further reductions in Inspection

- an end to Annual Performance Assessment for children and for adult services
 - possible “dual key” arrangements to manage the burden - replacing current costly AC gate-keeping function
 - streamlined statutory audit to focus on financial resilience, VfM and data quality
 - “regulatory” inspections of schools, care homes, etc to continue
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What role for the Inspectorates?

- audit and regulation but much less inspection
 - regulatory inspections of schools, care homes, etc
 - limited triggered inspections – subject to new “dual key” arrangements
 - sharing intelligence about performance with the sector
 - and what will government determine is the role of the Audit Commission?
