Key:



Content 0: For everyone

This can be accessed by any member of the public regardless of whether they work for a council or not.



Content 1: For all local authorities

Only available to you if you work for or represent a local authority




Content 2: For LGA members

Only available if you work for a local authority AND your council is an LGA member



Content 3: For subscribers

Available if you're a subscriber of that particular service, it may not matter if you work for a council or not. Also there could be multiple types of content 3 - e.g 3.1 could be Regulations, 3.2 could be Employers etc.






