



Residents' key concerns about problems affecting their neighbourhoods Our survey showed that things that concern residents most relate to anti-social behaviour.



The approach is working


Change in percentage of people perceiving high levels of ASB

Tough approaches but real results


- In <u>85%</u> of families complaints about ASB had ceased or reduced to a level where tenancy was no longer under threat
- In <u>80%</u> of cases tenancies were sustained
- In <u>36%</u> of cases an improvement in schooling was reported



RTF approach to areas





What does being a Respect area mean?

- 1) Establishing a **Family Intervention Project (FIP)** that challenges and changes the behaviour of the most problematic households perpetrating anti-social behaviour.
- 2) Establishing **parenting programmes** for families at risk of/or behaving anti-socially. (you may want to mention the upcoming announcement)
- 3) Demonstrating openness and accountability through **Face the People** sessions.
- A renewed commitment to using the full range of available tools and powers to tackle both causes and symptoms of anti-social behaviour.
- 5) Adoption of the **Respect Housing Standard by key** landlords in the local area
